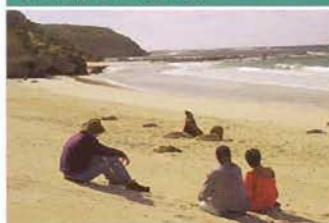
EYRE PENINSULA

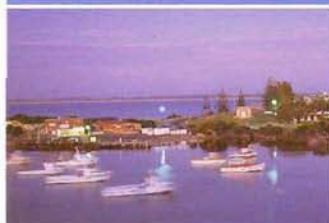
FLEURIEU PENINSULA
